With the recent cold and snowy weather, we have missed a number of days of school. Because of the possibility of losing numerous days prior to high stakes tests such as ISAT, PSAE, and the AP exams, the Administrative team has proposed a number of calendar revisions that will allow more instructional days before graduation and more professional development days after graduation. A sum-



mary of those calendar moves is included below.

The calendar changes may alter some family plans, and some students may even miss school because of family plans. A common question is how will students' absences be coded because of the change in calendar. There is no change in how the school codes student absences, regardless of a change in calendar circumstances. The school always codes a student's absence as excused, unexcused, or truant. The only time a student's absence is coded as excused is when there is a death in the family, the student is sick, for a church event, or for a family emergency. The difference between an excused absence and

an unexcused absence for students is in the amount of time provided to do makeup work. An excused absence allows a student to have two days to make up work for every excused day absent. An unexcused absence allows for only one day to make up work for every unexcused day absent.

School attendance is very important for student success. Statistics show that students who have the best attendance also have the most academic success. This year, 13% of our Seniors had perfect attendance in the first semester, as well as 17% of the Juniors, 19% of the Sophomores, and 25% of the Freshmen, As you can see, as students get older, there are more things that sometimes pull them away from school. Sometimes families need to pull their children from school for their own personal family business, or sometimes a family wants their child to take part in an activity that conflicts with school. All families need to make their own decisions based upon what is best for their children. Just because the school codes the absence as "unexcused" does not mean we have placed a value judgment upon that family decision. It just means that we are following the school code definition of excused, unexcused, and truant

Because the District has utilized all five (5)

Emergency Days in January as allowed by School Code in the 2013-14 Calendar, the following changes are necessary:

- 1. Cancel February 12, 2014 One Hour Early Release and attend full day of school.
- 2. Postpone February 17, 2014 In-service Day and attend full day of school on February 17th. Move In-service Day to May 29, 2014.
- 3. Continue with March 20, 2014 Hour Early Dismissal to allow for second night of High School Parent-Teacher Conferences.
- 4. Postpone March 28, 2014 In-service Day and attend full day of school on March 28th. Move In-service Day to May 30, 2014.
- 5. Continue with April 11, 2014 Hour Early Dismissal prior to Easter Break.
- 6. Attend school on Monday, April 21, 2014. Previously this was a Not In Attendance Day.
- 7. Postpone the May 5, 2014 Half-day School Improvement afternoon and attend full day of school on May 5, 2014. Move Half-day School Improvement Day to May 28, 2014.
- 8. As this calendar stands, the last full day of student attendance = Tuesday, May 27, 2014. The last half-day of student attendance = Wednesday, May 28, 2014.

Now with an additional snow day on February 5th, that will bring more changes. With a snow day on 2/5, that puts us over the 5 snow days the District had built into the calendar. So stay tuned to the District office for more information as it becomes available

I want to close by promoting Project Leaf. Superintendent Scott Kuffel is looking for a large, diverse group of people to give the District feedback on the future direction of our School District. With the opportunity presented by the passing of the one-cent sales tax, we have discovered that we have not done a lot of long range planning and needs assessing for our District. The District is looking for people willing to commit to a process to help to determine and prioritize where to spend our money, time, and resources. The Superintendent and School Board members will be involved in the process, as well, however, they are seeking public stakeholders' ideas and opinions before moving forward and making definite plans.

Classroom Happenings:

- Earth Science and Environmental Science students have been growing sunflowers! In Earth Science, students tested different types of soil (sand, clay, regular soil) to see which type of soil would grow the best plant. Students took data for ten days to observe which type of soil grew the tallest plant. Some of the students were shocked to find out that their plants did grow in plain sand and clay. In Environmental Science, students planted sunflowers in empty two-liter bottles. Students created a miniature Hydrologic (Water) Cycle and watched as the cycle progressed to produce water that infiltrated the soil and helped their plant to grow.
- This week the sophomore English class completed their reading of Night, by Elie Wiesel, a powerful memoir detailing his experience at Auschwitz-Birkenau.
